



What's in 1 Corinthians 10?

- In this chapter, Paul returns to one of the church's questions that of eating meat sacrificed to idols.
- Paul was not bound by rigid rules, but one of his freedoms was the freedom to not do as he pleased.
- He saw that there was much more at stake than whether he was capable of exercising his rights.



Past Examples 10:1-13

Privileges and Failures

In this section Paul lists **four privileges** the ancient Israelites enjoyed and then **four failures** by those same people.

He then teases out several implications and applications for us.

Further Important Points

Four Privileges and Four Failures

Four Privileges - 1) Supernatural guidance by the cloud, 2) Supernatural rescue through the Red Sea, 3) Supernatural provision of food, 4) Supernatural provision of water. To top it off, Paul declares that Christ was spiritually present with them throughout their time in the wilderness.

Four Failures - 1) Idolatry with the golden calf, 2) Sexual sin with thousands of pagan women, 3) Testing the Lord by complaining against him and his servant Moses, 4) Further grumbling against the leadership of Moses and Aaron.



Past Examples 10:1-13

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Direct Applications

- We also have Christ with us, "I will be with you always."
- He has saved us supernaturally by his death on the cross. Our privileges are actually greater than theirs.
- Yet, we may still fall into idolatry through engaging in covetousness or our preferred false concepts of God.
- Christians frequently fall into sexual sin just as the Israelites did - but usually do not immediately die.
- We may often still grumble against God when we are not thankful for his goodness and provision.



Past Examples 10:1-13

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11 Now these things happened to them as an example, but they were written down for our instruction, on whom the end of the ages has come.

12 Therefore let anyone who thinks that he stands take heed lest he fall.

11 Now these things happened to them as an example, but they were written down for our instruction, on whom the end of the ages has come.

- Here Paul insists upon the relevance of the Old Testament for Christians.
- He expects us to learn from the stories.
- They are Scripture and should be treated by us as such - not as a less important group of obscure books.

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12 Therefore let anyone who thinks that he stands take heed lest he fall.

- Let's be sure not to fall into the trap of overconfidence, thinking we are stronger than we really are.
- Peter was quite certain he would never deny Jesus, but alas, he was wrong.
- Let's remember our weaknesses and the ease with which temptation can ensure us.

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13 No temptation has overtaken you that is not common to man. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tempted beyond your ability, but with the temptation he will also provide the way of escape, that you may be able to endure it.



- The other side of overconfidence is imagining that no one has ever had to face the issues that we do.
- We can talk ourselves into "under-confidence" in our ability to endure temptation by not believing that will help us through our trials.



Craig Blomberg, Denver Seminary God won't give us anything we can't handle, so long as we rely on his strength, yielding ourselves to the power of his indwelling Holy Spirit, rather than trying to resist temptation on our own ...

Our culture would rewrite the end of verse 13 so that it said, "But when you are tempted, he will also provide a way out so that you don't have to stand up under it any longer," but that of course is the opposite of what God actually inspired Paul to write.

From previous chapters we remember that the issue of Christians eating the meat from (or even *at*) pagan temples was one of the controversies in the Corinthian church.

- Paul contrasts this with the participation in the Lord's Supper and the sacrifices at the Jewish temple.
- He points out the demonic nature of pagan worship which the Corinthians poorly understood.

Knowing When to Flee

• Paul's counsel to "flee idolatry" is more than good advice.

 It's a warning that when temptation is near, our best defense is to run away to escape the present danger. 1 Corinthians 6:18

2 Timothy 2:22

1 Corinthians 6:18

Flee from sexual immorality. Every other sin a person commits is outside the body, but the sexually immoral person sins against his own body.

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2 Timothy 2:22

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So flee youthful passions and pursue righteousness, faith, love, and peace, along with those who call on the Lord from a pure heart.

Side Bar on Spiritual Realities

19 What do I imply then? That food offered to idols is anything, or that an idol is anything? 20 No, I imply that what pagans sacrifice they offer to demons and not to God. I do not want you to be participants with demons.

- Our worldview is very much influenced by a secular, anti-supernatural bias.
- We do not like discussions of demons angels maybe are OK - but not demonic beings.
- Paul knew better and warned this church accordingly.

Side Bar on Spiritual Realities

Typical Western Mindset

God (Distant if he even exists)

[A Big Gap Filled with Nothing - maybe angels or aliens]

 Earth (Knowable mainly through science and our five senses.)

A More Biblical Mindset

- God (from whom we are cut off only by our sin)
- Angels and demons who have access to our world.
- Earth (Good but fallen and therefore corrupt in many ways.)

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Other Important Verses

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1 Peter 5:8-9 8 Be sober-minded; be watchful. Your adversary the devil prowls around like a roaring lion, seeking someone to devour. 9 Resist him, firm in your faith, knowing that the same kinds of suffering are being experienced by your brotherhood throughout the world.

James 4:7-8 7 Submit yourselves therefore to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you. 8 Draw near to God, and he will draw near to you. Cleanse your hands, you sinners, and purify your hearts, you double-minded.

Thoughts on Application

- As Paul has said earlier in this letter, we should make it a point to defer to the weaker brother or sister.
- By this he does not mean the self-righteous legalist, but rather the newer or less informed believer.
- We need to constantly be on guard lest our freedoms somehow cause the weaker Christian to stumble into sin.

1 Corinthians 10:31-33

Thoughts on Application

- Paul, in this passage, clearly assumes that the Christians in Corinth would find themselves enjoying meals with unbelievers.
- His was not a segregated, standoffish faith.
- The reputation Christians have for being judgmental, joy-killing bores is sometimes well deserved.
- Yet genuine holiness if it is going to impact the people around us - must be seen in our everyday interactions with the world.



Do All for God's Glory 10:23-33

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31 So, whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God. 32 Give no offense to Jews or to Greeks or to the church of God, 33 just as I try to please everyone in everything I do, not seeking my own advantage, but that of many, that they may be saved.

- Our freedom is less important than the our neighbor's good, whether a fellow Christian, a Jewish person or someone of some other religious or non-religious view.
- All that we do should be done with the goal of framing the gospel uncompromisingly, yet always in the best cultural light.

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



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

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We find Christian freedom in its true creativity when we follow Paul's ... ground-rules for life together in Christ. They really need no more than stating, contemplating and obeying.
