

# ACts 10:42-43



*Here we have Peter in the first instance of intentional proclaiming of the gospel to a non-Jewish crowd.*

# Preach the Word

- What does it mean to **preach the word?**
- If you have a ministry in which you teach others, do all of the following:
  - Stay faithful to the Scriptures.
  - Communicate the Gospel clearly.
  - Emphasize Jesus Christ.
- If you don't have such a ministry, then be supportive of those who do.
- This last point is vital due to the next point that Paul makes to Timothy.



Paul prophesied of a coming day when audiences would insist on only hearing teaching that is easy to listen to - teaching that only tells them what they want to hear ... The idea is that people want to be scratched where they itch, as they dictate what the messages should be ...

God help us if the content of the message of the church is dictated by the "felt needs" and "itching ears" of those who attend. If that happens no one will ever be truly changed, and change is what we really need.

# As for You

- These are Paul's ways to counteract the itching-ears model of (non) discipleship;
- **Always be sober-minded** - Timothy needs to be self-controlled and clear-headed. The most basic sense of this word means not to be intoxicated.
- **Endure suffering** - Paul was living this out as he wrote this letter. Anyone in Timothy's place should expect the same.
- **Do the work of an evangelist** - Perhaps Timothy was a genuine evangelist. In any case, it implies that anyone who preaches the word must be sure to make the gospel clear.
- **Fulfill your ministry** - This entails all of the above, but first of all it requires Timothy to "Preach the word."

# A Drink Offering

- Paul was certain that his death was near.
- History tells us that he died within a year of this writing.
- Paul's thirty years of faithful ministry ended with his execution.

- 4:6 Roman citizens, if they were put to death, were usually beheaded.
- This was to allow them to avoid the suffering of, say, the cross or death in a public spectacle with wild animals.

- So the image of a “drink offering” may be a hint at the pouring out of Paul’s blood.





- **Luke** is the same Luke that wrote both the **Book of Acts** and the **Gospel of Luke**.
- He was a doctor (**Col. 4:14**) and was probably taking care of Paul during his later life.

# Mark

- **Mark** is the “**John Mark**” that wrote the **Gospel of Mark**.
- He and Paul had a parting of ways in **Acts 15**, but that wasn't the end of his work.
- In that passage we learn that **Paul** teamed up with **Silas** while **Barnabas** brought Mark with him.
- He was Mark's older cousin and no doubt mentored him during their travels.
- **Peter**, who evidently knew Mark from childhood, refers to him as “**Mark, my son**” (1 Peter 5:13)

# Hebrews 12:1-3

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, 2 looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God. 3 Consider him who endured from sinners such hostility against himself, so that you may not grow weary or fainthearted.
