Something to Start Us Off

• Try to describe a time when an important deadline caught you by surprise.

Something to Notice

- To find out what motivated the manager, read v.4 again. What does it say?
- In v.9 Jesus straightforwardly gives us a lesson from the story. What does he say we should do with our "unrighteous wealth [mammon]"?
- Another principle Jesus teaches in this section is found in v.10. Read that verse one more time.

Something to Understand

In vv. 10-13 we see the love/hate contrast similar to what we saw earlier in Luke 14:25-33. It is best to take these as terms relative to one another, something like accept and reject.

- What do you think was going through the manager's mind when he found out that he was going to lose his job and that he would have to give an account? (vv. 1-2)
- Imagine you are one of the manager's clients in vv. 5-7. How might you respond to the offer he makes you?
- Some people find v.8 confusing. Can you describe what you think Jesus means?

Jesus reminded his disciples that they were stewards of their earthly resources, not owners. So they should use their possessions with eternity in mind. — Tony Evans
