


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The Pastoral Epistles

- The **Letters to Timothy and Titus** are related.
- Both of these younger men were Paul's assistants and apostolic delegates.
- Just as Paul left **Timothy** to finish a job he had started in **Ephesus**, Paul left **Titus** on the island of **Crete**.
- All three letters address pastoral issues such as:
 - Finding good leaders
 - Teaching sound doctrine
 - Encouraging good works among believers.

- Crete is the largest of the Greek Islands and forms the southern boundary of the Aegean Sea.
- The island was once home to the Minoans, who date back thousands of years B.C.
- They were possibly the oldest European civilization.
- They later gave birth to the Philistines.

- By Paul's time, the people of Crete had already had a long reputation for being rude and obnoxious.
- According to Paul, this reputation was well-deserved.

Cretans in History

- **Cicero** (100 - 43BC) wrote in *De Republica* that Cretans "consider piracy and brigandage honourable."
- **Polybius** (200 - 118BC) said, "So much in fact do sordid love of gain and lust for wealth prevail among them, that the Cretans are the only people in the world in whose eyes no gain is disgraceful."
- In this chapter Paul will quote **Epimenides of Cnossus** who goes back to around 600BC.

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Paul's Letter to Titus

- **Titus**, like **Timothy**, was a younger convert of **Paul**.
- He is not mentioned in the book of **Acts**, but his name appears **12 times in Paul's letters** before this.
- According to **Galatians 2:3**, Titus was a Greek – a Gentile convert.
- Titus's job was to bring more order to the churches of Crete.
- This would not be easy for, as we have seen, Cretans were a disorderly bunch.

Good Works

- The Phrase "**good work(s)**" appears **six times** in the **three chapters** of **Titus**.
- By comparison it appears **six times** in the **ten chapters** of **1 & 2 Timothy** combined.
- Other than the **Gospel of John** (2x), it never appears more than once in any New Testament book.
- While good works are important in the **Pastoral Epistles**, they are especially important in **Titus**.

Paul's Letter to Titus

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- Paul begins with a long, doctrinally rich greeting.
- He gets right down to business expecting Titus to try to find qualified elders "in every town."
- He ends the chapter by reminding Titus that this might not be easy.
- Crete was a difficult spiritual environment, so there would certainly be opposition to Titus's work.

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

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
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

Greeting 1:1-4

- Paul identifies himself as both an **apostle** and a **servant (slave = doulos)** of God.
- God has appointed him to serve **his elect** (the church) for the sake of **their faith ... and their knowledge of the truth.**
- Our God "**never lies.**" Literally, "The unlying God," "the God without falsehood"
- The truth is simply part of who he is.

Before the Ages Began

- Literally, “**before times eternal**”
- Prior to the 20th Century it was widely thought that the universe simply always existed.
- Then came **Albert Einstein** and **Edwin Hubble**.
- Their conclusions brought us to the idea of an **expanding universe** – which points back to **a beginning of everything - even time**.

How Truth Is Revealed

- God has every right to decide how he will reveal himself to the world.
- In his wisdom he has decided to do so through the preaching of his word.
- Paul was appointed to this, as were the other apostles.
- They passed the task on to others - and so it keeps going through the centuries from that time.
- We might wish there was another way or a better way - but that is not ours to decide.

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
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
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- These qualifications are similar to those in 1 Timothy 3.
- Paul is not demanding perfection, but he describes a clear standard of character that would contrast with the general population of Crete.
- The overall picture is one of an orderly man with an orderly home.
- On top of that, he must hold tightly to sound (healthy) doctrine and be able to teach God's word.
- This includes the correction of those who are in error.

One reason Paul had left Titus on the island of Crete was that he might organize the local assemblies and “set in order” the things that were lacking. That phrase is a medical term; it was applied to the setting of a crooked limb. Titus was not the spiritual dictator of the island, but he was Paul’s official apostolic representative with authority to work.





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The saying is trustworthy: If anyone aspires to the office of overseer, he desires a noble task. 2 Therefore an overseer must be above reproach, the husband of one wife, sober-minded, self-controlled, respectable, hospitable, able to teach, 3 not a drunkard, not violent but gentle, not quarrelsome, not a lover of money. 4 He must manage his own household well, with all dignity keeping his children submissive, 5 for if someone does not know how to manage his own household, how will he care for God's church? 6 He must not be a recent convert, or he may become puffed up with conceit and fall into the condemnation of the devil. 7 Moreover, he must be well thought of by outsiders, so that he may not fall into disgrace, into a snare of the devil.



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
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
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- There was a faction of these that continuously gave Paul trouble wherever he went.
- In addition it seems Cretans in general did not know how to take a hint.
- Titus had to be ready to be firm with them or else the wrong kind of people and teaching would dominate in the churches.

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
