- In **Chapter 9** our rabbi reminded us of some of the details of worship in the temple under the **Old Covenant**.
- He also explained just how Christ comes as the Mediator to finally fulfill all that the Old Covenant anticipated.

 - Is Effective
 - Has Been Sealed
 - Is Complete

What's in Hebrews 10?

Our Key Verses

Hebrews 9:27-28

27 And just as it is appointed for man to die once, and after that comes judgment, 28 so Christ, having been offered once to bear the sins of many, will appear a second time, not to deal with sin but to save those who are eagerly waiting for him.

What's in Hebrews 10?

- The teacher starts by reiterating the inadequacy of the Old Testament sacrifices.
- He contrasts them with the better sacrifice of Christ.
- Since Christ offers us **complete forgiveness**, there is no need for any further offering for sin.
- If we truly are forgiven in Christ, we need to live as if we know that is true.
- There is a warning not to keep on sinning, but to live like people whose hearts are now pure.
- We need to **keep going forward** in our relationship with the living God in the **full assurance** of our faith.



23 Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who promised is faithful. 24 And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, 25 not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near.

Hebrews 10:1-4

- Our rabbi friend is very much reiterating what he said to us last week in Chapter 9.
- The law has but a shadow of good things to come.
- We have now the substance in Christ.
- The sacrifices under the Old Covenant were meaningful, but insufficient.

Colossians 2:16-17

> Meaningful Sacrifices

Insufficient Sacrifices

Colossians 2:16-17

16 Therefore let no one pass judgment on you in questions of food and drink, or with regard to a festival or a new moon or a Sabbath. 17 These are a shadow of the things to come, but the substance belongs to Christ.

Meaningful Sacrifices

The Old Testament sacrifices had meaning.

- They were completely scriptural.
- They were commanded by God.
- They were highly instructional.
- They served, year by year, as a reminder for the people of their sins.
- It was right for Israel to offer them.
- They foreshadowed the sacrifice of Christ.

Insufficient Sacrifices

The Old Testament sacrifices were insufficient.

- A shadow must be related to something with substance.
- The Old Testament sacrifices were, therefore, insufficient by their very nature.
- They were insufficient by design.
- They never really removed the people's consciousness of sin.
- They rather served as a continual reminder of sin.

In the Old Testament era, the Israelites had only shadows. The substance is in Christ.

The shadow of a key cannot unlock a prison door; the shadow of a meal cannot satisfy a hungry man; the shadow of Calvary cannot take away sin.

Psalm 40:6-8

- Read Psalm 40:6-8.
- Our rabbi is quoting from the Septuagint sometimes called the LXX.
- This is why the quotation is not exact for us.
- The LXX was written in Greek in Alexandria, Egypt a few hundred years before Christ.
- It was the most common Bible in use at the time the New Testament was written.

Complete Agreement



Psalm 40:6-8

- 6 In sacrifice and offering you have not delighted, but you have given me an open ear.
- Burnt offering and sin offering you have not required.
- 7 Then I said, "Behold, I have come; in the scroll of the book it is written of me:
- 8 I delight to do your will, O my God; your law is within my heart."

Complete Agreement

- 10:7 Jesus came specifically to do the will of God the Father.
- God the Father and God the Son were in complete agreement about what needed to be done to justly take away our sin.
- It was recorded beforehand in "the book," the Scriptures of the Old Testament.



Chuck Smith (1927-2013), founding pastor of the Calvary Chapel Movement The whole Old Testament was really about Him. It was full of prophecies concerning Him. It contained numerous types that foreshadowed Him. All the sacrifices were about Him. All the feasts and festivals depicted Him. The design of the tabernacle and temple was all about Him.





The Holy Spirit Says

- 10:11 The Old Testament priests kept standing because their work was never done.
- 10:12 Jesus sat down at the right hand of God because the work He did lasts forever.
- 10:13 Christ now waits for His enemies to be defeated.
- This solemnly implies that not everyone will accept Christ's finished work.
- 10:14 Christ's offering of Himself perfects us for all time. That means forever.
- Your salvation is secure in Him.

Selective Memory

John 19:28-30

The Holy Spirit Says

- 10:15 This verse introduces an Old Testament quotation by saying that the Holy Spirit said it before.
- This implies the divine inspiration of the original prophetic text.
- It was written by the **prophet Jeremiah**, it was previously quoted in **Hebrews 8**, but the Holy Spirit was speaking through them both.

Selective Memory

- 10:16 God helps us to remember His laws.
- 10:17 God chooses to forget our sins.
- Do you find that encouraging?
- 10:18 The finality of Christ's sacrifice is the clear teaching of this passage.
- We now have complete forgiveness in him.

John 19:28-30

28 After this, Jesus, knowing that all was now finished, said (to fulfill the Scripture), "I thirst." 29 A jar full of sour wine stood there, so they put a sponge full of the sour wine on a hyssop branch and held it to his mouth. 30 When Jesus had received the sour wine, he said, "It is finished," and he bowed his head and gave up his spirit.





Full Assurance 10:19-39

 As with the previous section, we are going to divide this one up into three more bite-sized chunks.

- What does it mean to have full assurance?
- It means we are never shy about coming into the presence of God.
- We should be in awe of him.
- We can be deeply humbled by the privilege.
- But we always know that he welcomes us.
- He wants to enjoy personal fellowship with us his people, his kids.

Hebrews 4:14-16


14 Since then we have a **great high priest** who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast our confession. 15 For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin. 16 Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need.

- 10:22 Let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith.
- 10:23 Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering.
- 10:24 And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works,

Hebrews 10:26-31



- This is another of those terrible warning passages in Hebrews that few people really like.
- · But they are here so we need to hear them.
- Those who rejected the law of Moses, our teacher reminds us, suffered the punishment of stoning - an ancient version of the death penalty.
- The punishment deserved by those who reject Christ is put in the form of a question, "How much worse ...?"

> Hebrews 6:1-3

Hebrews 2:2-3

2 For since the message declared by angels proved to be reliable, and every transgression or disobedience received a just retribution, 3 how shall we escape if we neglect such a great salvation? It was declared at first by the Lord, and it was attested to us by those who heard.

Hebrews 6:1-3

Therefore **let us leave the elementary doctrine** of Christ and go on to maturity, not laying again a foundation of repentance from dead works and of faith toward God, 2 and of instruction about washings, the laying on of hands, the resurrection of the dead, and **eternal judgment.** 3 And this we will do if God permits.





- Our author expects better things of his audience.
- We should expect better things of one another.
- We should be willing to endure hardship for our faith - and should have compassion toward those who are enduring such struggles.
- Our continued walk with Jesus, will inevitably encourage others.

Hebrews 6:9-12

Hebrews 6:9-12

9 Though we speak in this way, yet in your case, beloved, we feel sure of better things—things that belong to salvation. 10 For God is not unjust so as to overlook your work and the love that you have shown for his name in serving the saints, as you still do. 11 And we desire each one of you to show the same earnestness to have the full assurance of hope until the end, 12 so that you may not be sluggish, but imitators of those who through faith and patience inherit the promises.




Conclusions
