

- By the time of the Roman Empire, Sardis was already 1000 years old.
- It was the capital of the ancient kingdom of Lydia.
- It was also an important city when it was part of the Persian Empire.

- Gold and silver were both found in the area, which resulted in Sardis growing rich.
- Perhaps as a result, it was the place where modern coins were first produced.
- Like all cities in that world, Sardis had its temples.
- One was to Artemis, the goddess that was best known for her temple in Ephesus.

- Sardis was most famous for its military strength.
- Still, it was repeatedly conquered.
- The Cimmerians, the Persians, the Athenians, and Alexander the Great all overran the city.
- This was repeatedly due to the soldiers of Sardis feeling too safe.

- In 17 A.D. the city was destroyed by an earthquake but rebuilt with money from Rome.
- This was more proof that the wealth and military strength of Sardis were not enough to protect it.







#### The Letter to the Church in Thyatira Revelation 2:18-29 The Format of the Letter(s):

- 1. The Command to Write
- 2. Attribute(s) of Jesus
- 3. What's Right with the Church
- 4. What's Wrong with the Church
- 5. What They Need to Do
- 6. A Promise to the One Who Conquers (Switch)
- 7. The Personal Call to Anyone with an Ear (Switch)



The message to Sardis is a warning to all "great churches" that are living on past glory ... spiritual ministries often go through four stages: a man, a movement, a machine, and then a monument. Sardis was at the "monument" stage, but there was still hope!

Let's now read the whole letter.

- The seven stars, we know, are the seven angels of the seven churches (Rev 1:20).
- The seven spirits are somewhat more difficult.


- In Zech 4, the prophet sees a vision of seven lamps, which are then connected with the Spirit of God.
- Zech 4:10

These seven are the eyes of the LORD, which range through the whole earth.

- In Isaiah 11, we also have this pertaining to the Messiah.
- Isaiah 11:1-2
- 1 There shall come forth a shoot from the stump of Jesse, and a branch from his roots shall bear fruit.
- 2 And the Spirit of the LORD shall rest upon him, the Spirit of wisdom and understanding, the Spirit of counsel and might, the Spirit of knowledge and the fear of the LORD.

- In the first four letters, Jesus started by saying something good about each church.
- Here he starts right in with a severe criticism.
- This church was not at all living up to its reputation.

- Sardis had fallen to invaders in the past when its soldiers slept.
- Enemy armies scaled its steep hillside and caught its armies off guard.
- In the same way, this church needed to wake up and get back to work.
- Spiritually, it was about to completely die.




• Sign #1

A dead church worships its past.




• Sign #2

A dead church is inflexible and resistant to change.




• Sign #3

A dead church often has carnal and lazy leadership.



• Sign #4

A dead church neglects children and youth.



• Sign #5

A dead church lacks evangelistic and missionary zeal.

- It is likely that the church in Sardis was once a very alive and Spirit-filled church.
- But those days were gone.
- The reputation remained, but the life was now lacking.

- This church already had everything it needed to be a strong and vibrant church.
- It just needed to remember what it had been given, wake up, and reverse its present course.

- The coming of Jesus is supposed to be a comforting thought for believers.
- In 1 Thessalonians 4, Paul reminds the church of the Lord's return and then says,
- "Therefore encourage one another with these words."
  (1 Thess 4:18)

- In this verse, Christ speaks of his coming to Sardis and it sounds more like a threat.
- A living church should always be looking forward to Christ's return.

#### Hebrews 9:27-28

And just as it is appointed for man to die once, and after that comes judgment, so Christ, having been offered once to bear the sins of many, will appear a second time, not to deal with sin but to save those who are eagerly waiting for him.

- Evidently, not everyone in Sardis was part of the problem.
- Jesus knows those few who are faithful and will reward them accordingly.
- Even in the deadest church there may still be a few true believers.

- Ginger and I both came out of very traditional church backgrounds.
- We did not come to an understanding of the gospel or to a personal faith in the normal context of church.
- And yet it happened.

- The book of life is mentioned seven times in the book of Revelation. This is the first time.
- This book contains the names of all the Lord's people.
- Their names are written there from the foundation of the world.

#### Revelation 13:8

And all who dwell on earth will worship [the beast], everyone whose name has not been written before the foundation of the world in the book of life of the Lamb who was slain.

- True believers, those who are victorious conquerors with Christ, will persevere in their faith.
- They will remain faithful till the end.

 These are the ones who publicly acknowledge that they belong to Jesus.

Matthew 10:32-33


32 So everyone who acknowledges me before men, I also will acknowledge before my Father who is in heaven, 33 but whoever denies me before men, I also will deny before my Father who is in heaven.

 These believers will also wear white garments as members of the bride of Christ.

• Rev 19:7-8


Let us rejoice and exult and give him the glory, for the marriage of the Lamb has come, and his Bride has made herself ready; it was granted her to clothe herself with fine linen, bright and pure.

- This is our usual reminder.
- What Jesus says to this church, he says to all the churches, and to us as well.



All of the church's man-made programs can never bring life, any more than a circus can resurrect a corpse. The church was born when the Spirit of God descended on the Day of Pentecost (Acts 2), and its life comes from the Spirit ...

When the Spirit is grieved, the church begins to lose life and power. When sin is confessed and church members get right with God and with each other, then the Spirit infuses new life—revival!



- The problem in Sardis was a sense of false confidence.
- Just as its soldiers felt safe in their fortress, which had a reputation for being strong, this church felt safe due to its good reputation.
- Its public image was not a good reflection of its lackluster reality.

- If a church begins to pay more attention to its outward image than to the substance of its spiritual life, it is in danger of becoming a dead church.
- If a church looks toward its past rather than its present and future, it runs the danger of becoming a dead church.

 When a church's members, especially its leadership, begin to think they have paid their dues and can now relax rather than maintaining a vibrant walk with the Lord, this church will begin to die.

• In other words, we must always pay attention to the substance of our Christian life and let our reputation take care of itself.



As far as I can see in my study of the Scriptures, the church has a threefold objective: upward, inward, and outward. To put it another way, the church is here to exalt God, edify the saints, and evangelize the world.
