- Previously in Genesis:
- In Genesis 13, Abram and Lot separated to make room for their large flocks and herds.
- Abram stayed in the highlands of Canaan while Lot went down into the well-watered Jordan valley.

- Previously in Genesis:
- In Genesis 14, Abram and his men had to rescue Lot when he was taken captive by foreign invaders.

- Previously in Genesis:
- After this, God firmly established His covenant with Abram (now Abraham).
- He gave him a few unconditional promises plus the sign of circumcision for him and his descendants.

18:1-15

18:16-33

19:1-29

19:30-38

- 18:1-2 three men One was the LORD, i.e., Yahweh
- The other two were angels (See 19:1).
- Despite his bowing, it is not clear that Abraham immediately recognized his visitor as God.

- 18:3 O Lord This word (*Adon*) shows respect but does not have to be used only for God.
- In v.12 Sarah uses the same term for Abraham.
- Even modern Hebrew still uses it as we might say "sir," or in Spanish "señor."

- 18:4-8 Abraham offered typical hospitality to his guests with this treatment.
- 18:9-12 Now God gives Abraham a specific promise of a son.
- Sarah is listening in and laughs inwardly, not out loud.

- 18:13-15 Yahweh reveals that He knows Sarah's thoughts and heard her inward laughter.
- Sarah's laughter seems prompted by unbelief.
- She pops out of the tent, evidently flustered, to deny that she laughed at all.

- 18:13-15 Is anything too hard for the LORD?
- This is a great reminder for us.
- We know God is powerful, but we lose sight of that when it comes to our own prayers.

- 18:16-19 God revealed things to Abraham that He didn't reveal to everyone.
- All the nations of the earth shall be blessed in him
- This is a reminder of God's covenant promises.

- 18:20 the outcry against Sodom and Gomorrah
- The terrible sins of Sodom and Gomorrah "cried out to heaven" for punishment.
- In 4:10, God said something similar to Cain about the voice of Abel's blood.

- On the wickedness of Sodom
- Genesis 13:13

Now the men of Sodom were wicked, great sinners against the Lord.

- 18:21 Of course God knows everything, and He was fully aware of the evil in Sodom.
- Likely, His justice moved Him to demonstrate that He was in full possession of the facts.
- In the end only the two angels will physically go there.

- 18:22 The LORD stayed with Abraham.
- 18:23 Abraham shows concern for other people as in 13:8-9 when he gave Lot first choice.

- 18:24-25 Of course God will do what is just.
- Ezekiel 33:11

Say to them, As I live, declares the Lord God, I have no pleasure in the death of the wicked, but that the wicked turn from his way and live; turn back, turn back from your evil ways, for why will you die, O house of Israel?

- 18:26-33 As we'll see, not even ten righteous people could be found in Sodom.
- Abraham goes home until early the next morning.
- Later, he will come out and from a place up in the hills where he lived and see the destruction.

19:1-29

Genesis 13:12

Abram settled in the land of Canaan, while Lot settled among the cities of the valley and moved his tent as far as Sodom.

• Genesis 14:12 [When the kings conquered Sodom] They also took Lot, the son of Abram's brother, who was dwelling in Sodom, and his possessions, and went

- 19:1 The two angels The same two who visited Abraham are now identified as angels
- Lot was sitting in the gate of Sodom This was the center of public activity.
- Lot was now one of Sodom's leading citizens.

- 19:2-3 Lot, like Abraham, wants to show hospitality to the angels.
- He probably had a clue what would happen if they spent the night outside.
- First mention of unleavened bread in the Bible.

- 19:4-5 The text makes clear this was not some wacky fringe group.
- The whole city was given over to this kind of sin.

- 19:6-8 Lot's offering his daughters is explained (though not justified) by the demands of hospitality.
- A host was obligated to protect his guests at all cost.
- Further, a (probably useless) biblical case can be made that his offer was in fact for a lesser sin.

- 19:9-14 Lot's sons-in-law Lot's daughters were really what we would call engaged (or betrothed).
- But he seemed to his sons-in-law to be jesting.
- They were native Sodomites and unable to imagine that anything could be wrong.

- 19:15-16 He lingered Fortunately, God's mercy overcame Lot's procrastination.
- 19:17-19 Lot says he can't go to the hills, but he'll end up there.
- Perhaps his love for his life in Sodom made him hesitant to leave.

- 19:20-22 Zoar = "tiny place."
- For I can do nothing until you arrive there.
- Remember the Lord's discussion with Abraham.
- God would not destroy the righteous with the wicked.

- 19:23-26 Lot's wife was trailing behind him with her heart still in Sodom.
- She looked back and died.
- Jesus used this event as a warning to others.

19:1-29

Luke 17:32-33

32 Remember Lot's wife. 33 Whoever seeks to preserve his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life will keep it.

III. God Destroys Sodom

19:1-29

- 19:27-29 The overthrow of Sodom and Gomorrah is used as a warning elsewhere in the Bible.
- It comes up no fewer than 12 times by 9 different authors in later books.



For example, Jude 1:7

Sodom and Gomorrah and the surrounding cities, which ... indulged in sexual immorality and pursued unnatural desire, serve as an example by undergoing a punishment of eternal fire.

19:30-38

- 19:30 He was afraid to live in Zoar
- So, Lot ends up in the hills where the angels initially told him to go.
- We also see how Lot's daughters were tainted by life in Sodom which their parents seemed to cling to.

V. Lot and His Daughters

19:30-38

- 19:31-38 The Moabites and the Ammonites never amounted to much.
- In Numbers 25, Moabite women will lead the Israelites astray into both immorality and idolatry.
- Ruth the Moabitess will be a later exception.

Love for the World

- Love for the World
- Lot's wife, and maybe even Lot himself, seemed a little too tied to the life they had in Sodom.
- John warns us about this in his first letter.

- 1 John 2:15-16

15 Do not love the world or the things in the world. If anyone loves the world, the love of the Father is not in him. 16 For all that is in the world—the desires of the flesh and the desires of the eyes and pride of life—is not from the Father but is from the world.

- The Certainty of Future Judgment
- 2 Peter 2:6-10

6 If by turning the cities of Sodom and Gomorrah to ashes he condemned them to extinction, making them an example of what is going to happen to the ungodly; 7 and if he rescued righteous Lot, greatly distressed by the sensual conduct of the wicked 8 (for as that righteous man lived among them day after day ...

Conclusion

- The Certainty of Future Judgment
- 2 Peter 2:6-10

... he was tormenting his righteous soul over their lawless deeds that he saw and heard); 9 then the Lord knows how to rescue the godly from trials, and to keep the unrighteous under punishment until the day of judgment, 10 and especially those who indulge in the lust of defiling passion and despise authority.
