


Introduction

The Big Idea for Today

The Tabernacle of the Old Covenant prepares the way for Christ's establishing of the New.





- 26:1-14
- The most beautiful layer was on the inside.
- This was the colorful fine linen.
- Over that were layers of animal hair and skin.
- Think about Jesus.

26:1-14

• Isaiah 53:2-3

2 For he grew up before him like a young plant, and like a root out of dry ground; he had no form or majesty that we should look at him, and no beauty that we should desire him. 3 He was despised and rejected by men, a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief; and as one from whom men hide their faces he was despised, and we esteemed him not.

- In a day when Egypt's gigantic pyramids and temples were already old, Israel built a portable tent.
- Later, Jesus was fully human and so did not look especially divine on the outside.
- And yet on the inside, He was not only human.
- He also possessed the perfectly holy nature of God.

26:1-14

Philippians 2:7-8


7 but [he] emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. 8 And being found in human form [schema – that which is outwardly visible], he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross.

L. Fine Curtains 26:1-14

- Paul deliberately chooses the word for "outward appearance" in Philippians 2.
- To every casual observer Jesus appeared as a 100 % normal human being.
- Nothing about His outward schema shouted "God."







- Acacia wood is extremely durable and resistant to decay.
- We might expect that from a tree that can grow in the arid climates of the Middle East.

- It was covered by gold which does not easily corrode.
- Gold is not oxidized by oxygen, so if it is pure, it retains its shine long-term under normal conditions.
- This is one reason gold is so valuable.

- God wanted the Israelites to build a tabernacle that would last.
- He did not want the priests and Levites constantly needing to repair it.
- Yet listen to what Peter says about our faith.

26:15-30

• 1 Peter 1:6-7

6 In this you rejoice, though now for a little while, if necessary, you have been grieved by various trials, 7 so that the tested genuineness of your faith--more precious than gold that perishes though it is tested by fire--may be found to result in praise and glory and honor at the revelation of Jesus Christ.

- The tabernacle was made of durable materials, but God wants our faith to be more durable than that.
- It is certainly much more valuable.



- Same Colors, Different Meaning
- The veil is made of the same beautiful material as the innermost tent curtain.
- There is blue, purple, scarlet, fine linen and cherubim woven into the fabric (v. 31).

- Same Colors, Different Meaning
- Now it's not a ceiling above you suggesting heaven.
- It's a barrier that implies "Keep out!"
- The same beauty that covers you now blocks you from entering the holiest place of all.

Consider this flashback to Genesis 3.

Genesis 3:24

He drove out the man, and at the east of the garden of Eden he placed the cherubim and a flaming sword that turned every way to guard the way to the tree of life.

- Adam and his descendants could not reenter the Garden due to the cherubim placed at the entrance.
- Similarly, no one was able to enter the Holy of Holies in the tabernacle where the ark was placed.

 The only exception was the high priest once each year on the Day of Atonement.

He had to enter that day with sacrificial blood.

• Later when the temple was built, there was a similar veil that was some 60 feet high and four inches thick.

This is the veil that was torn at the crucifixion of Jesus.

Matthew 27:50-51

50 And Jesus cried out again with a loud voice and yielded up his spirit. 51 And behold, the curtain [aka "the veil"] of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. And the earth shook, and the rocks were split.

 This signifies that the Holy of Holies is now open to us through faith in what Christ has done.

V. The Screen

- These last two verses indicate that the outer entrance was made of similar material as the inner parts.
- But one difference: There are no cherubim.
- This is a door, not a wall.

IV. The Screen

- This was the front door of the tabernacle.
- The priests went in morning and evening, to trim the lamps, offer incense, or change the bread.
- Yet it was still only for the priests.
- Because of Jesus, the door to God's presence is now always open to any that will respond.

IV. The Screen



• John 10:7-10

7 So Jesus again said to them, "Truly, truly, I say to you, I am the door of the sheep. 8 All who came before me are thieves and robbers, but the sheep did not listen to them. 9 I am the door. If anyone enters by me, he will be saved and will go in and out and find pasture. 10 The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life and have it abundantly."

Conclusions

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From the outside the tabernacle was nothing special; from the inside it pointed to Jesus.

- Weather-beaten skins on the outside, held up by durable acacia frames, a plain tent in the desert,
- But step through the screen and every color, every board, every curtain brought you into God's presence.

Conclusions

From the outside the tabernacle was nothing special; from the inside it pointed to Jesus.

- The glorious Son of God was wrapped in humble flesh.
- He did this so that sinners could live inside the beauty of God's presence forever.
- This is what it means to be in Christ.

Conclusions

Every barrier in this chapter has now become a door.

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- The veil that once blocked the holiest place was torn in two.
- The screen that only priests could use is now Jesus Himself saying, "I am the door – come in every day."

Conclusions

Every barrier in this chapter has now become a door.

- Because of Good Friday and Easter morning, there is no longer any closed curtain between you and God.
- There is only an open invitation.

Conclusions

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- All these layers and boards and curtains were a 3-D preview of the real tabernacle.
- First it was the body of Jesus, and now it is the church.

Conclusions

God's ultimate plan was never to live in a tent; He wanted to live in you.


... 21 in whom the whole structure, being joined together, grows into a holy temple in the Lord. 22 In him you also are being built together into a dwelling place for God by the Spirit.
